Message from Sharon:

Dear Friends,

How quickly time flies! It seems as if it was just yesterday that I finished putting the Christmas decorations away. And now we are preparing for Lent. I am reminded that time is not only precious, but also sacred.

Traditionally, during Lent we spend time being more intentional about diet, prayer, bible study, and participation in Sunday worship services. Some things we give up; other things we take on. Yet rarely do we stop to think about our use of time itself. Indeed, many people feel as if they are held captive by time—needing more hours in the day to get all their tasks done.

So, what would happen if we decided to be more intentional about our use of time? How would we ever begin?

One of the things I do from time to time is to make a graph—7 columns (days) across, and 24 rows (hours) down. I always begin by using one colour of marker to block off time for sleep! Then I use another colour to block off time for morning and evening prayer. Moving forward, I use various colours to mark off work time, commuting time and other fixed obligations. Are there any blank spaces left? I hope so; if not, there is a problem!

We had a wonderful time at our Bazaar again this year. Many of our parishioners pitched in and worked really hard to make this year's Bazaar another huge success. Financially, we did extremely well. We had our big day on November 4th, continued to sell more items on November 5th and had a mini-Bazaar on December 3rd. With a few extra sales here and there, we made over \$8500. This was amazing and very helpful to the church financially.

Certainly, the financial component was very important for the church but there was an even brighter side to the event. Our parishioners came together in so many positive ways and the time of fellowship was priceless.

We shared our time, talents and treasures and we had fun doing it! Volunteers gave their time to come to work parties where we baked goodies, made crafts, wrapped gift baskets and Pick a Pocket prizes. People donated their crafts, their treasures that needed a new home and their time to set up for the Bazaar, to sell their goods and to clean up afterwards. Our local businesses generously gave us donations for our gift baskets (i.e. No Frills at Townline, Golden Gate Eatery & Takeout, Stone Art by Peter, Another Spin, Pizza Hut and Speedy Auto) and silent auction items (another Tom Hodgson original painting, the Canada wheelbarrow made by Bill Lamb and Stone Art by Peter). Our Country Store returned this year with wonderful crafts, jams and jellies, pickled beets, wooden crafted candles, fire starters and teacup candles. The Café served delicious biscuits with your tea and coffee in the morning and then a lunch with choices of Apple Squash Soup, Hamburger Soup and Pulled Pork on a bun. Our new menu was well received. Our amazing team met after the Bazaar to debrief our event and to make recommendations for next year. Yes, we are planning our next Bazaar and Craft Sale for November 2, 2024.

We are starting our work parties on Monday, January 22nd at 1 pm. We will begin by making greeting cards and will continue with our work parties doing other craft ideas on Monday afternoons. Please join us if you can help create items for the Bazaar but also to enjoy the fellowship with other parishioners. You don't have to come every week and we encourage you to bring new ideas for us to try. Everyone's time talents and treasures are important. We are a great team who enjoy working together and sharing the positive fellowship!

After the Bazaar, we did do some outreach to our community. Knitted hats, mitts and scarves were donated to the Salvation Army, Clara Hughes Public School, David Bouchard Public School, Pierre Elliott Trudeau Public School and the Ignite Foundation at the Durham District School Board. These items were well received by all and were greatly appreciated. Some of the shawls and blankets have been added to our Prayer Shawl Ministry which has been revived.

Thank you, Harry, for joining we ladies. Hopefully we will have more gentlemen join us in the future.


Next Month Helen Bajorek will be doing a presentation on Ukraine, and we will make postcards to send to the frontline soldiers.

CHOIR REHEARSALS: Every Sunday morning from 9:00 am - 10:00 am before the service begins.








